

State BEARFACTS 1995 – 2005

North Dakota

The population of North Dakota in 2005 was 634,605. Its rank was 48th in the nation.

PER CAPITA PERSONAL INCOME

In 2005 North Dakota had a per capita personal income (PCPI) of \$32,053. This PCPI ranked 27th in the United States and was 92 percent of the national average, \$34,685. The 2005 PCPI reflected an increase of 9.1 percent from 2004. The 2004-2005 national change was 4.9 percent. In 1995 the PCPI of North Dakota was \$18,865 and ranked 43rd in the United States. The 1995-2005 average annual growth rate of PCPI was 5.4 percent. The average annual growth rate for the nation was 4.2 percent.

TOTAL PERSONAL INCOME

In 2005 North Dakota had a total personal income (TPI) of \$20,340,705*. This TPI ranked 48th in the United States. In 1995 the TPI of North Dakota was \$12,221,268* and ranked 49th in the United States. The 2005 TPI reflected an increase of 8.9 percent from 2004. The 2004-2005 national change was 5.9 percent. The 1995-2005 average annual growth rate of TPI was 5.2 percent. The average annual growth rate for the nation was 5.3 percent.

COMPONENTS OF TOTAL PERSONAL INCOME

Total personal income includes net earnings by place of residence; dividends, interest, and rent; and total personal current transfer receipts received by the residents of North Dakota. In 2005 net earnings accounted for 67.3 percent of TPI (compared with 63.4 in 1995); dividends, interest, and rent were 17.3 percent (compared with 20.4 in 1995); and personal current transfer receipts were 15.4 percent (compared with 16.2 in 1995). From 2004 to 2005 net earnings increased 9.0 percent; dividends, interest, and rent increased 10.7 percent; and personal current transfer receipts increased 6.7 percent. From 1995 to 2005 net earnings increased on average 5.8 percent each year; dividends, interest, and rent increased on average 3.5 percent; and personal current transfer receipts increased on average 4.7 percent.

EARNINGS BY PLACE OF WORK

Earnings of persons employed in North Dakota increased from \$14,921,313* in 2004 to \$16,179,223* in 2005, an increase of 8.4 percent. The 2004-2005 national change was 5.4 percent. The average annual growth rate from the 1995 estimate of \$9,292,265* to the 2005 estimate was 5.7 percent. The average annual growth rate for the nation was 5.5 percent.
